PRECIOUS BLOOD

The Precious Blood of Our Lord was offered at the Vigil Mass for All Saints Day. A parishioner fighting back tears said, "Do you realize it has been **30 months** since we have been able to receive from the chalice? Later I received a calculated update in my email. It has actually been **31** ½ months!

Last week, after speaking with his medical advisors, our Bishop determined that we could once again begin distributing Communion under the form of His Precious Blood. As far as I can figure, this is the end of all of the restrictions that were imposed over the past few years to keep us safe from that unique circumstance, the name of which I do not care to write anymore.

At the moment, we will not be having the Precious Blood at all of the Masses. Firstly, we need to build back up our army of Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. For the past two and a half years, we've needed far fewer ministers (by more than half!) and so have not replaced those who have stepped down. We will also need to order more wine! Store bought wine cannot be used. Wine for Mass must be free from additives that are found in most commercially purchased wines. It is trickier to figure out how much we need than one might think. We need to estimate how many of you will be at Mass? How many of that number will take advantage of the cup? How many Eucharistic Ministers will we have? At how many Masses will we have both species? It is easy to run out and easy to have so much in storage that it goes bad. But we will settle into a system soon.

I remember, as a very little person and serving at the altar, my home parish offering the Blood of Christ for the very first time. Hardly anybody received. My beloved pastor was a diabetic and so he turned to me, who was a fourth grader and said, "Please finish this. The Blood of Christ." As I remember it, it was a very full chalice, and this was my very first time tasting anything remotely like alcohol. I recall dutifully consuming it all at once and having tears streaming down my face and Father saying, "Thank you." So, as we figure this out, please bear with!

FROM THE FORGOTTEN CABINET

There are only three sheets of paper and a handwritten note in the file entitled, "PARISHIONERS - Living in the Parish but Affiliated Elsewhere." When St. Sebastian Parish opened in 1928, all the other parishes had already been established. This meant, of course, that our parish boundaries were carved out of the boundaries of other established parishes. I suppose that not everybody was excited about leaving their home parish for the upstart parish that was popping up in West Akron. These three pages listed the names of those who lived in our boundaries, which at the time were almost as large as the City of Akron itself extending out toward Medina and Peninsula. The largest of the list of names (52 with 24 different addresses) were from St. Bernard and lived on such streets as Storer, Orlando and Roslyn. The other parishes were non-territorial parishes: St. Hedwig's, Sacred Heart (on Madison), St. John and St. Peter. In all they listed 17 names but only 8 different addresses.

The only note was on beautiful, pink stationary with a picture of a rose on it sent from Mrs. Carline Brugmann who lived on Sunset View Drive who wrote:

Dear Father Zwisler,

I am writing to let you know that I will no longer be able to attend St. Sebastian's as it is too difficult for me to come by bus from where I live. I prefer to attend St. Vincent as it is more convenient.


