FROM THE FORGOTTEN CABINET

A handwritten letter on Akron Beacon Journal letterhead came to Monsignor Zwisler just before Christmas of 1952:

Dear Father,

The enclosed greeting is one which we have mailed to each of our 1,500 newspaper boys. May I wish you all the joy and happiness of this season of the Prince of Peace.

It doesn't say *why* it was sent but attached is a color picture of Santa with a Happy Holidays message and signed by Joseph M. Aylward, Circulation Director (Class of 1931) and perhaps 100 further names from the circulation department. Interesting was the message to the newspaper boys on the reverse:

A description of the service you offer to your customers as a newspaper boy generally emphasizes the courtesy,

dependably and enthusiasm, which you must develop to do a good job. The immediate advantage of your work is the buying power you gain with the money you make. This is a lesson in economic cause and effect that is reason enough for you to be a newspaper boy.

During the holiday season, we are disposed to look beyond the mercenary advantage of our labor. It is fitting to note that the benefit of the relationship with your customers included more than the opportunity to realize a profit in cash. In your daily contact with the families whom you serve, you gain an understanding of the human person that is perhaps the most important observation you will ever make.

Your intimate knowledge of the customer, his family, and his home makes it unlikely you can believe he is a monster because of a difference in color, creed, or race. The revelation of courage and perseverance in the handicapped, the sick, the aged that you see so closely is a wonderful guide to your own practice of humility and charity.

It is our wish that your association with the Beacon Journal be conducted in an atmosphere of good will and of mutual trust. We hope that the relationship between you and the men and women of this newspaper will produce in you a lifetime pride in your career as a Beacon Journal newspaper boy.


