FROM THE FORGOTTEN CABINET

In 1959, Archbishop Hoban had sent to all Catholic Schools the first "Handbook for Catholic Elementary School Principals," citing that, "principals of our elementary schools have a great variety of duties to perform and innumerable decisions to make." Therefore, "it has been felt necessary to gather [all of the diocesan policies] in one place for the convenience of the older, experienced principals and as a handbook for the new principals, especially in the newer schools."

Page one gave the philosophy of the diocese as it concerns Catholic schools. It seems appropriate to give it verbatim during this Catholic School's Week:

"It is the aim of the Catholic elementary schools of the Diocese of Cleveland to cooperate with the Church and with parents so to assist, guide, inspire, instruct and form their children as to help them to perfect themselves, with the assistance of God's grace unto the attaining of the supreme goals of human life in time and in eternity.

To this end, the Catholic schools shall strive:

To perfect the intellect of their students with all good intellectual habits, natural and supernatural.

To perfect the will of the students with all good moral habits, natural and supernatural.

Specifically, it is the purpose of the Catholic elementary schools of the Diocese of Cleveland.

To impart basic religious instruction and formation.

To impart basic knowledge, understanding and skill in the fundamental school subjects; the language, arts, arithmetic, the social studies.

To impart basic knowledge, understanding and skill in other subjects needed for life in our modern world: the fine arts, natural science, health, safety, physical education, etc.

The objective is to produce a well-rounded individual; intellectually, morally, emotionally, esthetically, socially; an individual prepared to fulfill his duties to himself, his family, his civil community, his world, his Church and his God."
