Angel Scholarship Fund

Thank you to everyone who has chosen to support St. Sebastian Parish School through the Angel Scholarship Fund! This program allows Ohioans to receive a 100% Ohio tax credit of up to \$750 (\$1,500 if married filing jointly) for cash donations to the Angel Scholarship Fund, and St. Sebastian may be selected to receive your donation. For the 2023-24 school year, the school has been able to distribute almost \$70,000 in Angel Fund monies to 86 students. We recently learned that 111 donors contributed over \$102,000 in 2023 to distribute for the 2024-25 school year (this is a preliminary total: final numbers will be released in mid-Feb. after any corrections are made and credit card fees are subtracted). We are pleased that this will enable us to help even more families next year!

Please note this year there is an extended deadline for 2023 donations: Donations made by April 15, 2024, are eligible for the scholarship tax credit in the 2023 tax year (note: these funds will be included in our totals raised in 2024 to distribute for the 2025-26 school year). So, there is still time to make a contribution and factor it into your 2023 Ohio tax filing. Visit

From the STEM Coordinators

Grades K-3, by Susan Vernon

Welcome, parents! After a long hiatus due to COVID, the primary grades were happy to open their doors to excited and creative parents who managed the classroom Halloween parties. There were engineering contests with candy pumpkins and toothpicks. Another class played a memory game with fall items on the Smart Board. One classroom was even transformed into a Halloween lab with lots of spooky activities for each child:



decorating cookies, marshmallow-on-a-spoon races, and mummy dressing! The Christmas season was another opportunity for classes to use their STEM engineering and design skills for unique gifts for their families. Fingerprint snowmen, glitter glass bulbs, and reindeer ornaments were among the favorite annual projects! Classes also created beautiful Advent wreaths to place in their homes.

Finally, parents visited the school once again to serve as personal shoppers during the Santa Shop days. Students had a difficult time budgeting their money with SO many wonderful gift selections this year, and juggling all those purchases home provided a real engineering feat! Thank you to all parents for supporting our school and STEM education! It's good to have you back in our classrooms for special events!

Grades 4-6, by Jennifer Slegus

The 4th-grade students were busy with many STEM-based activities during the 2nd quarter. The students learned about the California Gold Rush in a cross-curricular, social studies and geometry STEM activity. While creating a map based upon John Sutter's Mill in Sacramento, Calif., during 1848, they explored types of lines, line segments, shapes, and the concepts of area and perimeter. For another project, the students read the book "Balloons Over Broadway," which details how inventor Tony Sarg was commissioned to create the first Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade balloons. The students were given the conundrum that there was a shortage of helium, but the parade must still go on! They were tasked with creating not only a balloon, but also a device for holding the balloon "afloat" during the parade. After much planning, collaborating, and creating, the students paraded around the building, showing off their amazing creations! The 5th-graders are also completing an integrated

Native American unit, learning about Ohio tribes in social studies class and then reading the book "The Sign of the Beaver." They are designing slide show presentations for the tribe they are researching and constructing a shadow box/diorama of their tribe's housing.

The 5th-grade class has been learning about the importance of decomposers in the process of recycling dead material to create rich nutrient soil. The students



designed an experiment to determine whether earthworms prefer wet or dry areas. After investigating decomposers with earthworms, the 5th-grade students were able to measure decomposition rates by measuring the change in the balloon inflation created from the release of CO₂ by yeast activity. The 6th-grade students spent some time learning about the Earth. They learned about ways to identify minerals, then put that knowledge to use by going to the lab and testing various minerals to identify them. Our 6th-graders also learned about the rock cycle and completed a rock density lab for which they calculated the density of rocks based on the rock's mass and volume that they measured.

Grades 7-8, by Megan Sanford

The junior high school science fair was held in Z-Hall Dec. 13. All students created projects to demonstrate their mastery of the scientific method and further research a topic that interests them. They presented their projects to parents and a panel of judges. Volunteer judges included science teachers from local Catholic high schools, as well as science experts in our school community. All of the students did an outstanding job with this event! Awards were presented to the top three projects

in each grade. See the "Students in the News" page for a full list of the awardees. Good luck to all of our students who will compete at the local grade school fair at Walsh Jesuit High School on Feb. 10.



Before Christmas, our 7th-grade students learned about the Earth's atmosphere and human impact on our atmosphere. They learned about the layers of the atmosphere and how they are defined by differences in composition and physical properties, how energy moves through the Earth's system, and the different components of weather (temperature, wind speed and direction, humidity, precipitation, visibility and air pressure) and how to measure them. The 7th grade has also been learning about predictions and how to connect evidence, explanations, and observations to conduct logical and knowledgeable analysis.

In 8th-grade science classes, students have been studying plate tectonics, seismic activity, and the Earth's geologic time scale. Students were tasked with building towers that could withstand an earthquake to demonstrate their understanding of earthquake-resistant engineering processes. Additionally, 8th-grade students made their own mold-and-cast fossils using plaster and clay, and they practiced carbon dating techniques with Skittles candy. In preparation for April 8's solar eclipse, 8th-grade students made videos demonstrating how and why solar eclipses happen. The best videos were entered into a solar eclipse contest being held by the Ohio Academy of Science. Before Christmas break, 8th-grade students learned about chemical reactions and crystals while making Borax snowflakes.




