HOLY FACE RELIC

Veneration of the Holy Face Relic will take place after Masses on Palm/Passion Sunday, March 24th. A special one-hour presentation on the Holy Face will begin at 12:15 p.m. "The original Holy Face of Jesus engraved images which include a papal seal and certificate of authenticity, are in a relic class of their very own. The certificate verifies that the image has been touched to Veronica's Veil, the True Wood of the Cross, and the Lance that pierced Christ's side. Since these images were touched to the instruments of Our Lord's Passion, which were drenched in His Blood, they have therefore been touched to the Blood of Christ, and so are considered to be 'Living Images of Jesus Christ'."

YOU ARE INVITED TO THE CHRISM MASS

On Tuesday, March 26th at 7 p.m. at our Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in downtown Cleveland on the corner of East 9th Street and Superior, there will be the annual celebration of the **Chrism Mass by Bishop Edward Malesic** along with most of the priests and deacons of the Diocese. At this Mass, all the holy oils that are used for baptism, confirmation, ordination, anointing of the sick and consecrating churches and altars will be blessed for use throughout the diocese over the next year. Also at this Mass, the priests renew their priestly vows and promises. You are invited to this two-hour Mass. I recommend showing up early to get a seat! It may also be viewed on our diocesan website HERE.

In preparation for the Chrism Mass, the remaining holy oils at our parish, (oil of the sick, oil of the catechumens and holy Chrism) must be properly disposed. Our chief sacristan, Karen Spangler, will collect all of the oils out of the ambry (the place where the oil stocks are kept) and burn them. Then the stocks will be carefully cleaned and shined up to receive the new oils that will be blessed by the Bishop at the Chrism Mass.

FROM THE FORGOTTEN CABINET

With the current opportunities coming from funding from the state for families to send their children to Catholic schools, there is a concern in some circles that we will try to stuff as many students as we can into the school in order to take advantage of the financial opportunity. That is not the intension. In fact, we have considered our school "full" though not at capacity. Our first priority is to give families of parishioners of St. Sebastian Parish a superior and Catholic education and after that, extending this opportunity to others who would make a good fit at the school up to the number of students we believe is our optimum number which, as stated above, we are already pretty much hitting.

That being said, in 1952 there was a concern with overcrowding in the Diocese of Cleveland Schools. 88,244 students were enrolled in Catholic schools. A November 4th, 1952 letter from the Superintendent of Catholic Schools declared that the "reports of enrollment reveal serious, indeed harmful overcrowding." This was placing "an insupportable and even inhuman burden on too many of our Sisters."

"When the number of pupils exceeds 50 per room, provisions should be made to divide the class. Under no circumstances is a teacher to have over 60 pupils." In that same year, St. Sebastian Parish School reported having 547 students without a class lower than first grade. There were 12 teachers, 9 religious and 3 lay, making a reported ratio of 46 to 1! This was not even the all-time top enrollment at the school. All schools, including public schools, were being stretched to the limit under the load. Teachers and space were limited. Fortunately, we are much better equipped today for the educating of our youth.

Attached to the above statistics, there was a list of 31 students who didn't show up on the first day of school. Brennan, Firestone, lacomini were among the family names listed along with "last known addresses." It became apparent that many had moved, and some had changed schools to the Elms, Holy Family, St. Peter or Copley.
