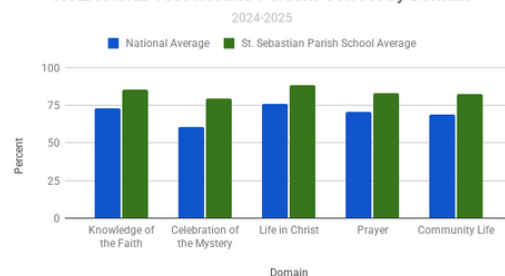
BUILDING FOUNDATIONS

This year, our students have also been blessed with meaningful programs and guest speakers that help them understand the beauty, dignity, and sacredness of every human person. Junior high students are participating in Culture Project presentations on Human Dignity, Sexual Integrity, Social Media, and Pro-Life Apologetics. Grades 3, 5, and 8 are engaging with the McKeon Education Group through lessons on Friendship Skills for Life, Honor and Harmony, and Service Learning rooted in Catholic Social Teaching. Our students in grades 6-8 are also supported through the Greenleaf Signs of Suicide program and the LifeWorks Ohio Choose Life curriculum in 7th grade. Each of these offerings strengthens the moral and spiritual foundation we strive to build, helping students develop healthy relationships and inspiring them to recognize that we are all made in the image and likeness of our Creator. Together, we evangelize simply by witnessing to one another the saving grace of Jesus Christ.

CATHOLIC IDENTITY

The data here shows the 5th and 8th grade average scores compared to the national average scores for 5th and 8th grade students on the National Catholic Educational Association (NCEA) Assessment of Catholic Religious Education (ACRE) Test results chart. St. Sebastian Parish School 5th and 8th grade students demonstrated strong performance across all five domains: Faith Knowledge, Liturgical Life, Moral Formation, Prayer, Communal Life, and Missionary Spirit, when compared to the National Average. In all categories, St. Sebastian Parish School outperformed the national averages. This part of the assessment helps us see what our students know and understand of Catholicism.

FROM THE STEM COORDINATORS

Grades K-3, by Mary Heffern

Our Kindergarten classes had an exciting first quarter of hands-on learning. Students created apple volcanoes using apples, baking soda, and vinegar. They also practiced counting using candy corn in a tens frame. To wrap up their science exploration, they observed what would happen when pumpkin candy corn was dissolved in three different liquids—milk, water, and vinegar.

Our first-grade classes engaged in apple and pumpkin investigations where students measured the height of their apples and pumpkins, conducted sink-or-float tests, and explored the different parts of both fruits—inside and out. They also collaborated with their 5th-grade buddies to carve jack-o'-lanterns!

Our second-grade students created an "x-ray" of their arm and hand by drawing each bone, then painting their artwork with vegetable oil using Q-tips. Once displayed on the window, their work looked just like a real x-ray! They also designed disguises for their pumpkins using symmetrical shapes with help from their 6th grade buddies.

Our third-grade classes used tiles for a hands-on approach to learning basic multiplication and division facts. They also applied the scientific method in a paper airplane challenge. After receiving the teacher's original design, students could change just one variable in order to compete for the longest flight. Their goal? Beat the teacher's model!

Grades 4-6, by Jen Slegus

The 4th-graders have been learning about animal and plant adaptations. The students completed several labs including a simulation lab where they discovered the differences and similarities of birds' beaks. They used different tools to show how well birds' beaks are adapted to eat specific foods. The unit culminated with an animal research paper. On Halloween, the students learned about physical and chemical changes while "capturing a ghost". They had to measure a solution using a graduated cylinder and record the reaction times, discovering that heat increases the rate of speed of chemical reactions. They also completed a gummy bear lab where the students soaked their gummy bears in different solutions to test how each solution would affect composition.

The 5th-grade class used the scientific method and the engineering design process in the "Penny Boat Challenge Lab". They designed a boat using only foil and tested the buoyancy by adding pennies to their design. They were able to improve their design and retest the buoyancy. After learning about photosynthesis, the 5th-graders extended their knowledge with a "Leaf Chromatography Lab", where they discovered how and why leaves change colors in the fall.

The 6th-graders completed several activities to practice investigating, measuring, calculating, identifying, and adapting new processes through the scientific method. The students completed measurement labs, where they spent time measuring mass and volume (standard shapes and water displacement). The students also conducted mineral identification activities involving the rock cycle.



Grades 7-8, by Megan Sanford

In 7th grade, students studied the engineering design process, empirical evidence, and the scientific method, especially how it will apply to their Science Fair project coming up. They enjoyed a STEM bridge building challenge where they had to use the Engineering Design process to build a bridge out of spaghetti noodles and marshmallows that would support a pouch of pennies. The students also participated in an H2Olympics Project Wet Lab where they learned about cohesion, adhesion and surface tension. A lab was also conducted where they had to test samples of water to find out the source of the pollution of their water sample.

In 8th grade, students explored experimental design and data analysis throughout the first quarter. They engaged in a variety of hands-on activities to deepen their understanding of the nature of scientific inquiry, including inquiry cubes, analyzing "mystery checks," and descriptive drawing exercises. The students also conducted several classroom experiments to practice essential scientific skills such as writing procedures, forming and testing hypotheses, making precise measurements, collecting data, and analyzing results. Many of these investigations came from the Project WET curriculum. For example, in the lab "Is There Water on Zork?", students performed a series of tests to identify which clear liquid was actually water by examining its physical and chemical properties—including reactivity, solubility, density, pH, odor, and cohesiveness. In a recent data analysis project, students became CDC medical researchers investigating the causes of a fictional zombie outbreak. Through this engaging scenario, they learned about key statistical concepts such as measures of central tendency, data organization, variation, and correlation. The 8th graders also completed a unit including detective stories by creating logic projects. These projects incorporated verbal, spatial and numerical logic to create games, puzzles, escape rooms and mystery stories.

Both 7th and 8th grade students are currently preparing science fair projects on topics of their own choice. The science fair provides an opportunity for students to apply the scientific method as they independently research an idea and design an experiment.



TEAM TRESSEL CHALLENGE

Recently St. Sebastian Parish School had the great privilege of welcoming Ohio's Lt. Governor, Jim Tressel, as our honored guest for the kickoff of the Team Tressel Fitness Challenge. The assembly energized our students with fun fitness activities, encouraged them to value "Quiet Time" as much as movement, and reminded them to strive for their best in mind, body, and spirit. Our students will participate in this ongoing challenge, receiving encouragement and incentives along the way to achieve their goals.

Grade-Level Socials

Socials organized several successful grade-level events over the summer. Rising 6th-graders enjoyed a pool party social at the Shaw JCC, and rising 8th-graders concluded their summer with a pool party at Fairlawn Country Club. We are currently planning additional grade-level socials throughout the academic year.

School-Wide Socials

Our two school-wide socials this fall, Trunk or Treat and Celebrity Bartending Night, achieved the highest fundraising amounts ever for the teachers' event fund! We also just concluded our largest social event of the year, the 12th Annual Ladies Luncheon and Christmas Boutique, which took place at Portage Country Club in early November.

Giving Back to Teachers and Staff

During the first quarter our junior high students all had the opportunity to visit Camp Damascus. Our 6th-grade students attended a Faith and Science Retreat; our 7th graders' retreat focused on Communication, Collaboration, and Compassion; and our 8th-grade students took part in a Confirmation Retreat to help prepare them for their upcoming sacrament. The students were able to spend a few days together in uninterrupted prayer and fellowship, growing closer in friendship, community, and faith. These experiences are truly transformative for our students, with experiences that will help to shape their faith throughout their lives.



Flight 93 Memorial Field Trip

In September, our 8th-grade students traveled to the Flight 93 National Memorial, a profoundly moving experience that left a lasting impact on their minds, hearts, and faith. As they walked the grounds and learned the stories of the passengers and crew, many students were struck not only by the historical significance of that day, but by its deep spiritual meaning. "This Memorial drew me closer to God by showing just how precious life is," shared Gabby Deagan, while Catherine Schlueter reflected on the power of unity, noting that "even though we are all so different, we can come together to do the right thing." Amelia Kilker was reminded that despite earthly differences, "we are all still God's children," and Avery Leffler expressed how seeing personal artifacts helped her recognize that these heroes were "real people, not just symbols." Several students made meaningful connections to their faith, including Noah Wojnicz, who saw in their bravery a reflection of Christ's sacrifice, and Jack Clymire, who shared that the experience taught him "to always resist evil and that God can help you overcome challenges." This annual trip continues to be a powerful opportunity for our students to grow in understanding, compassion, and courage as they prepare to enter young adulthood rooted in faith.



On Target For Christ Retreat, Grades 4 and 5

In October, students in grades 4-5, in partnership with senior students from Hoban High School, participated in a retreat, centered around the theme On Target For Christ.
