This year we have reorganized the teacher leadership roles for STEM activities and discipline matters. Our new Academic and Intervention Team is composed of three teachers who will oversee STEM activities as well as address discipline issues for specific grade groups. These teachers are Sue Vernon (K-2), Jennifer Slegus (3-5) and Megan Ritchie (6-8). School Accolades

Although it has been announced previously, I wanted to note how wonderful it is to have earned state-level recognition for excellence in STEM education. St. Sebastian was one of 54 Ohio schools to receive the Governor's Thomas Edison Award for Excellence in STEM Education and Student Research for our accomplishments during the 2018-2019 school year. Eleven of our teachers were also recognized individually with this award. This distinction is something to take pride in and a testament to the great work being done every day here at St. Sebastian Parish School.

Another fantastic distinction announced recently is the school's high scores on the MAP Growth Tests. Our scores from two years ago (2017-18), indicated High Achievement in all four subjects tested (math, reading, language usage, and science) and High Growth in reading, language usage, and science, with Average Growth in math. Results from last year (2018-19), indicate High Achievement and High Growth in all subjects across the board! We are pleased to see our math scores move from the Average Growth to the High Growth category. We are so proud of our students and teachers for this impressive academic growth, and we congratulate our school as a whole for ranking among the highestachieving schools in the Diocese of Cleveland, especially in language usage and science.

Flight 93 Memorial Field Trip

For the second year in a row, our 8th-grade students traveled to Shanksville, Pa., to participate in the annual commemoration of the Sept.11 terrorist attacks. It is a remarkable privilege for our students to share in this remembrance with the families who lost so much that day. Here are some reflections from our students that demonstrate what they learned from their visit about working together for the greater good, the symbolism of the memorial's design, and the power of prayer.

"The passengers came together to achieve one goal. They voted, using the American way, and they all believed that they needed to do their duty. They weren't soldiers, but civilians. Not victims, but heroes. They took control, and the world stayed safer because of it ... What stuck with me was that they knew it was scary, but they did it. They didn't know if things would turn out okay, or if their plan would even work. They just knew that they weren't going down without a fight." Clare Rothkopf

"Everything at the memorial has a place and a reason for the way it is designed. The park shows the flight path of the plane until it crashed. The Tower of Voices is 93 feet tall, for the flight number, with 40 chimes that each have a different pitch. I think the faith of these people was very great. Even throughout the last seconds until the crash, some passengers prayed. When Todd Beamer said the Lord's Prayer with the passengers and people on the other side of the phone, he showed that he had faith and trusted God ... [The passengers] were true heroes that I honor and respect, and I hope that I may have the same amount of courage and trust in God as they did." Anne Rea

"I took away that prayer is the one most important thing. Prayer was definitely the most important thing in the last seconds of the passengers' lives. From watching the movie, and then actually being at the site, I need to be grateful for everything I have, and I need to make sure that I remember prayer is the key point in our lives." The visit made an impact on our students, as you can see, and it serves as a powerful reminder to all of us of our many blessings here at St. Sebastian Parish School. May we continue to develop intelligent and compassionate students with the strength of faith to make a positive impact on the world.

From the STEM Coordinators

Grades K-2, by Susan Vernon

This past summer 60 students were involved in Camp Invention, a weeklong program designed to stimulate hands-on problem solving with creativity. Four teachers, Kelly Gupta, Mary Heffern, Molly Karg, and Jen Smee, led the "Super Hero Engineers" in sustainability projects. There were ships constructed to withstand the elements, as well as robots and other prototypes. Our budding engineers had a productive, educational experience!

The autumn season provided the perfect opportunity for students in K-2 to explore the delights of the season! All students celebrated Johnny Appleseed Day with many apple activities: investigations, dissections, tastings, and even art! Currently, pumpkins are in the curriculum, as students learn about life cycles and Halloween customs. The 1st-grade students loved their visit to Nickajack Farms, where they were thrilled to meet farm animals and understand a little more about agriculture. A fun hayride gave them a great overview of rural life!

Grades 3-5, by Jennifer Slegus

Students in the 4th and 5th grades are participating in a program titled "Destination Imagination." This program, which was founded in 1999, engages students in project-based challenges that build confidence and develop extraordinary creativity, critical thinking, communication, and teamwork skills. Destination Imagination is designed to involve students in exploring STEM/STEAM concepts in a hands-on environment, learning how to think (not what to think), and taking ownership of all decisions, creations, and

results. The 4th- and 5th grade students will be breaking off into teams with a different design challenge of their choice. The teams will design or research their challenge and build their invention or other established requirements. They will then create a story or play to coordinate with their research. Students will also be in charge of costumes, designing, and building of the scenery. The teams will present and perform these in an actual regional tournament with the possibility of progressing on to other tournaments. One thing that sets Destination Imagination apart from other programs is that the teachers and parents are not permitted to help the students with these challenges. This is

completely a student-based challenge. Our students are getting started on this amazing learning experience, and we are very excited to see what great ideas the students will create.

Grades 6-8, by Megan Ritchie

In reading class, 6th-grade students have been using technology to bring literature to life by creating group presentations that relate stories to their own lives and experiences. In social studies, students used technology to connect to real-life survivors of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. Then each student attended an interactive tour to over 200 9/11 monuments all over the world and wrote about their three favorite memorials. In social studies and science classes, 6th-graders have been working on the Traveling T-Shirt Company project, in which students work in teams to create and sell a T-shirt to benefit a charity. The groups research and choose a nonprofit organization, meet with vendors to review costs and artwork, and meet with marketing advisers to understand how to attract interested buyers. Students then create a proposal and pitch their ideas to a panel of judges during interviews that are done digitally via Google Hangouts. In science, 6th-grade students completed a lab that taught them how to measure using a graduated cylinder and how to use the metric system to measure volume of liquids. Students used a variety of tools to complete the lab, including pipettes, graduated cylinders, and beakers. Students also applied lab-safety techniques discussed in class.

Students in 7th grade have been analyzing technology and identifying the benefits of using specific technology in certain scientific investigations. They have been measuring the distance from one side of the classroom to the other using scientific measurements as well as other tools of measurement (ex. 16 "Reids" or 62 buckets). Students have also been analyzing and interpreting the risks and benefits of electric transportation.

Our 7th- and 8th-grade students have been exploring the scientific method and are hard at work on their science projects. The science fair is an opportunity for students to apply the scientific method to conduct independent research. The results of each student's research will be presented at the St. Sebastian School Science Fair on Nov. 20 in Zwisler Hall. Students who are judged to have used the scientific method properly and who have demonstrated thoroughness in their studies and effort are awarded prizes and may advance to compete in regional, state, and even national fairs.

Fall Sports Wrap-Up

Cross Country Team Takes Top Honors

Our cross country team wrapped up another record-setting year with the girls grades 6-8 team being named season champions for the Blue Division, winning all but one of their meets and recording two first-place individual finishes by Anne Rea and Scarlett Powell. The girls grades 3-5 team won four of their seven meets and took second place in the remaining three meets. The boys grades 6-8 team took 3rd place for the season, and the boys grades 3-5 team, although small in number, finished in 3rd or 4th place in every meet in which they had enough runners to compete as a team.



At the Oct. 13 diocesan championship at Cleveland's Edgewater Park, the girls grades 6-8 grade team won second place, which is the highest finish ever achieved by our school since we began competing in 2009 and the only time a team from Summit County has earned a medal in the championship! Anne Rea was our top runner, finishing 5th out of a field of 187. Other members of the team included Nadia Edgar, Isabelle Mastromatteo, Arden Powell, Scarlett Powell, Anysia Reimund, and Trinity Villarreal. The boys grades 6-8 team finished 10th, with John Paul Villarreal taking an impressive 15th place out of 265 runners.

At the state middle school meet on Oct. 20, St. Sebastian won the state runner-up trophy for the second year in a row in the girls Division 3 race. Our team's top five runners finished in the top 25: Anne Rea (7th), Julia Rea (16th), Anysia Reimund (17th), Scarlett Powell (18th), and Nadia Edgar (24th) out of 126 runners. Way to go, Terrier athletes, and many thanks to our dedicated coaches!

Football

Several of our students played on the 6th-grade CYO Saints football team that won both of its playoff games to earn a spot in the Oct. 27 championship game, where they lost a close game 13-6. St. Sebastian players on the team included Jay Brewer, Robert Butler, Andrew Cook, Matthew Dietrich, Jackson Rodeman, Everett Salisbury, Max Sinsley and Nate Sparhawk. Many other students played for Saints teams including three flag football teams (grades K-3), and a tackle football team (4th grade).

Annual Trip to the Flight 93 Memorial

This fall, our 8th-grade class traveled to Shanksville, Pa., to attend the 18th annual September 11 Observance held at the Flight 93 National Memorial. This is the second year in a row that our school has participated in the ceremony, and this year was just as memorable.

Our students watched the movie *Flight 93* on the early-morning bus ride to Shanksville, which helped them understand what the passengers experienced on that fateful day.

Our group arrived in time to listen to the morning ceremony's featured speakers, which included Vice President Mike Pence; U.S. Secretary of the Interior David Bernhardt; and Gordon Felt, president of the Families of Flight 93 organization. Mr. Felt, whose brother was one of the heroes on board Flight 93, took some time later in the day to talk to our students one-on-one after the ceremony in an area near the impact site. He spoke to our students about his brother and the other ordinary people on the flight, explaining how these heroes sacrificed everything, putting aside

their differences for the greater good of many and even voting before putting their plan of action in motion.

"Gordy Felt is an amazing speaker," said Principal Anthony Rohr, who accompanied our students on the trip along with Deacon Terry Peacock, several teachers and parent volunteers. "Our students were really lucky to have personal interaction with someone directly affected by a major historical event," Mr. Rohr said.

The students later toured the Flight 93 Memorial Museum, where one of the exhibits features very moving recordings of the last phone calls from the passengers and crew to their loved ones. Our group also stopped at the Tower of Voices, a 93-foot-tall memorial that holds 40 unique wind chimes, representing the voices of each of the victims. Deacon Terry led our group in prayer at the base of the tower as they remembered and prayed for these 40 heroes.

Mr. Rohr noted that St. Sebastian Parish School was the only school to attend the observance this year. "We are proud to provide this experience of a lifetime for our students," said Mr. Rohr, "and we plan to continue this meaningful tradition for future 8th-grade classes."

2019 Wings of Charity Gala

The HALO Foundation exists to develop students as servant leaders by recognizing specific overlooked needs in the community and illuminating the selfless example of the heroes of Flight 93.
