EUCHARISTIC DEVOTIONS!

We get the opportunity to adore and offer thanks to Jesus in a special way this week during our Annual Eucharistic Devotions which will begin following the 11 a.m. Mass and continues around the clock until Tuesday night, September 19. At 7 p.m. on Tuesday night there will be our closing ceremonies, so there will not be confessions this Tuesday night. There will be prayer each night at 7 p.m.

It would be greatly appreciated if you would consider adopting an hour of adoration. When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed on our altar, there needs to at least some of the faithful in attendance. Sign-ups are at the altar rail in front of the Blessed Virgin Mary statue. Even if one or two people are already signed up, sign your name also. There can be last minute emergencies that keeps someone away.

If you are wondering what to do during a Holy Hour, it is a time of thanks and adoration. We have so much for which we should be thankful (not the least thing is that we have Christ among us in the Eucharist - how blessed are we?) and we adore Him who is the source and summit of our life. It is perfectly fitting to sit quietly with our Lord, to speak with Him and to listen to what He might have to say.

FROM THE FORGOTTEN CABINET

There are some sporadic reports of where our students went to high school after graduating from St. Sebastian Parish School. In 1940, 11 students went to St. Vincent High, 22 to Buchtel, 3 went to Sacred Heart Academy and 5 were marked "doubtful."

In 1950 things changed a bit. 34 went to St. Vincent, 8 to St. Mary, Hoban saw 10 of our boys join, the Elms received 9 of our girls, Simon Perkins saw one of our students as did Buchtel and Western Reserve. Finally, in 1959, out of a class of 79 students (!!!) this was this breakdown:

St. Vincent: 28

Our Lady of the Elms: 13

Hoban: 12 St. Mary: 3 Buchtel: 12 Copley: 2

Western Reserve: 1
